The Tragedy of the Commons

- Common lands: pastures / waste dumps
- Assumption of "rational egoists"
 - Utility maximizers with only external reward
 - Private profit / shared costs
 - "market externalities"
- Accumulation of free-riders
- Degradation of the commons
- "socialism or privatism of free enterprise"

Governing the Commons

- Lab results show strong reciprocators
 - conditional altruistic cooperators / punishers
 - fairness of process, not just outcomes
 - internal motivations
- Policies assuming only rational egoists will "crowd out" reciprocity / collective action
- Third option: self-organized institutions
 - Avoiding tragedy of the (anti-)commons

Commonwealth

- Shared knowledge and communication media
 - Not subject to degradation / exhaustion
 - Product and presupposition of production
 - "comedy of the commons": the more the merrier
- "immaterial labor"
 - Process/ product of capitalism today is social life
 - Desire, subjectivity, affect, communication
- IP and the "problem" of incentives
- Open access (and / to) public education
